Guest Speaker: Marc Spijkerbosch

Rotorua Lakes Council's Community Arts Advisor.

Illusion murals. 3D pavement art; Community & Civic projects. Canvas. Trompe l'oeil. Born in Rotorua in

1967, Marc has done it all. He first made his mark over thirty years ago by convincing the Council the Tarawera Road reservoir desperately needed a paint job. So he gave it one. Art in public places or on utilities wasn't 'a thing' back then. But Marc persisted.

In the years since those bland days, art and sculpture installations have mushroomed in this city, its suburbs and environs. For the past decade it's Marc who's overseen much of its creation and placement. The Government Gardens sculpture trail's is a case in point. It was on his recommendation the Council adopted a policy, common in the USA, that

sees one per cent of a project's total cost levied, and earmarked to enhance infrastructure.

The water tower mural kick-started his career as a public spaces artist. After reading a *Herald* article, Len

Brookes from Keep Rotorua Beautiful invited him to paint the power boxes around town. He painted 27 boxes with the district's 27 lakes on them.



An invitation from Eru Potaka-Dewes to paint a mural at an ashram near Bangalore, India saw him create a fibreglass waterfall then paint a 3D bush scene complete with cascading water (from a pump he installed himself).

The whole experience had a profound spiritual impact on Marc which remains to this day.

U3A Committee member Wieland describes himself as a Ngati Berliner to start things with. He was indeed born in that troubled city during WWII and grew up in Berlin.

His working life began with a three-year apprenticeship in the Insurance industry. He was a claims adjuster for a while, didn't like it and freewheeled around the world for five or so years before coming back to Berlin to study IT. He left Berlin in 1972 and arrived — after travelling through the Americas — in NZ in 1973.

Establishing himself in Tokoroa,, Wieland worked for Forest Products, Kinleith. He was able to work with a similar computer mainframe and use the same computer language as he had in Berlin.

After a good twenty years in the South Waikato, Wieland came to Rotorua in '93 establishing himself on Seddon St where he still lives today. The School of Business and Computing (Waiariki) was his work home in the nineties. U3A identities such as Ann Sullivan and Judy Somerville were work companions. But it was not all Rotorua. There were 9 years spent in Hong Kong, 2001 to 2010. The Korean International School was his workplace and he was involved with teaching IT and English upskilling.

Returning from Hong Kong in 2010, he met his wife-to-be, Chintana, at the airport, as you do. Chintana was born in Bangkok but spent most of her life in Japan. She works as an on-call Thai/Japanese Interpreter at Rotorua Hospital.

Wieland has been active on the U3A Committee, also active with Grey Power, and pulls a few strings with SeniorNet.



A centre of interest for him is his involvement with small sailing craft as he has sailed local lakes and Pacific destinations such as Tonga, etc. Chintana, however, doesn't share the same affinity with waves, and he now concentrates more on another favourite pursuit, Photography. He had his first camera at 12 years old and is up with the play. He knows his onions. He also convenes a U3A Current Affairs Group and is member of the Photography and Cities groups.

Papers Past is divided into five sections:

- 1 **Newspapers:** Digitised NZ and Pacific newspapers from the 19th and 20th centuries.
- 2 **Magazines and Journals:** Digitised NZ journal publications. Each magazine or journal has its own page containing information about the publication, including the date range that is available online.
- 3 **Letters and Diaries:** Digitised full-text manuscripts. Currently this section only contains the papers of Sir Donald McLean.
- 4 **Parliamentary Papers:** Digitised reports from volumes of the Appendix to the Journals of the House of Representatives (AJHRs) and the Votes and Proceedings of the House of Representatives.
- 5 **Books:** A range of New Zealand books that were digitised as part of two pilots in 2012 and 2015. It also contains nineteenth century te reo Māori material listed in the bibliography Books in Māori/Ngā Tānga Reo Māori.



GROUP REPORT: WRITING GROUP (2)

This group has been under the direction of Gordon White since the passing of Pauleen Wilkinson last year. Gordon could be seen as your average post-war Kiwi male but his exploits have a definitive stamp to them, as he has taken on challenges and turned things on their heads.

Each speaker brings a different style and has a different emphasis sometimes loosely or tightly based on memories of one's family. Peter has taken us to the Phillippines and Rarotonga, and from Lancashire to Auckland. Volcanoes have dictated his career efforts since the sixties. A scientist/geologist with remarkable empathy with seemingly barren landscapes.

Gordon is a member of the Ulysses Motorcycle Club, has been overland to most places on our highways. Jenny, gone to Tauranga, has recollections of Christchurch in the 40s, 50s and 60s and growing up in that precise city of the South. Sally, with excellent diction, tells of 50s Auckland when the name Nathan rang strongly in the halls of corporate power. Dane came from Southern Rhodesia via South Africa to Rotorua with her dentist husband, Malcolm. The name Zimbabwe is an intrusion to her and others. Ngaire tells of her depth of background in roller skating up to New Zealand administration. Walking through wartime London with her mother and sister, a very young Ann B. by them to ring the doorbell at 10 Downing St. The responding butler regarded her quizzically. Helen more recently has told us of Girl Guiding and the challenges that posed. Not really a Carry On Camping scenario.

As the Hugh Jackman character said in 'Australia' about an eleven year old aborigine boy who has taken off.. 'He needs to have; he will have a story to tell. ...' And everybody who comes to **Writing** does have a story to tell. There are different approaches but often it rests with, who you are, where you're from and something about you which is relatable.
