

Many of us in U3A were raised hearing and reciting nursery rhymes and we've read them to children from sometimes beautifully illustrated books, but do we know their origins and meanings?

Susan Ackroyd, our April speaker, will tell us of her intensive research into the history of 20 nursery rhymes from the 13th to the

18th centuries and their relationships to political and social issues in England over time. The rhymes may sound innocent, but some are quite dark.



Susan sounds to be a very interesting person. With an educational background she started as a high school English/History teacher




before leaving to travel and then to work with adult migrants and refugees. Then while studying to become a lawyer she worked in vocational education, co-designing a tool to ensure quality training resources. After completing her law degree, she worked for 6 years in the field of elder law and then in her final 3 years before retirement she travelled Australia investigating problems in the workplace.



In 2024 she published her book "Rhyme and Reason" which would have been available for sale except they were sold out at Wellington U3A: these can be ordered.

JILL NICHOLAS



Bifurcated isn't a word bandied about much these days. However its definition - "of being divided into two parts" - makes it the perfect fit for U3A committee member Jill Nicholas.

Now there's a scary thought - two of her. Surely not?

'Fraid so. The dinkum reality is the Jill Nicholas most recognise is but one half of her persona.

Her birth name was Gillian Neill. So why the semi-pseudonym? It's always stuck in her craw that so many struggle getting their tongues around Gillian, opting to use the soft G in preference to its hard - and correct - counterpart. The result's Gillyan, hence the switch to pronunciation friendly Jill.

The change from Neill to Nicholas came via marriage. Jill's was in the days when it was still the 'done thing' for women to take their husband's surname.

Would she make the same switch in this supposedly more unshackled era? Hell, no.

She's a fully paid up, card carrying member of the 1970s women's lib revolution who freed the sisterhood from kitchen sink domesticity and into the workforce with its promises of equal opportunities and man-sized pay packets.

Yeah, right to that - but that's a subject for debate in another forum.

So back to unearthing Jill/Gillian's titillating past as the editor decrees we must.

She's resolute that there's very little of prurient public interest.



Put her under pressure and she accepts that maybe one or two could be agog to learn that if her mother had had her way the world could have been free of baby Gillian mere days after her birth.

Her 1941 arrival coincided with Japan's push into the Pacific.

As legend has it two new mums supposedly swapping knitting patterns on Matamata maternity hospital's veranda were in fact surreptitiously plotting how best to dispose of their newborns before the "yellow perils" made Aotearoa landfall.

Why they didn't proceed with their murderous intent is unrecorded. Possibly someone convinced them an infanticide conviction wouldn't be a good look on their previously pristine rap sheets.

As things transpired, both those babies went on to reach octogenarian status.

One was destined to make it onto the rich list. One wasn't. No prizes for guessing her identity.

Out from Stratford to Lake Rotokare near Eltham (googleable: Lake Rotokare Walk). The lake and environs are a pest-free sanctuary with a pest-proof fence around the lake including a thriving natural forest full of native birds. Met with a dedicated team (not DOC) checking on the resident Kiwis (viability, weight etc). They had specially trained dogs, radio transmitters and ropes for some of the steeper areas.

There were two tracks, the first , an easy 4 km around the lake. Second, there was the Ridge Walk. Medium to high level of fitness required, 1220 steps, 3-5 hours. I took the challenge. We started with a 235 m climb straight up on wood-supported steps...a lungs pounderer, then the track and steps beside the ppf working along to track one perimetering Rotokare.

North Island robins pecked at goodies scratched up by my boots and I heard saddlebacks in the vicinity.

Lunch and back to Stratford.


